PERFORMING ARTS CENTRE

At last, the Performing Arts Centre, at the Essendon Campus, is completed. This is a state of the art Theatre seating an audience of over 220. With a stage of 100 square metres and with professional light and sound equipment our students will have access to a facility that enable them to perform at the highest level.

Some work still needs to be done on the ground floor and the façade will be painted ready for a Grand Opening Concert on Thursday 18th July.

HOW ARE WE SUPPORTING STUDENTS TO LEARN?

COMMUNICATING ON STUDENT PROGRESS

It is crucial that there is strong communication between teachers, parents and students about student progress. We expect all students to demonstrate a level of achievement, regardless of class or teacher. We have unrelenting high expectations. Alongside that we have supports, interventions and challenges in place to ensure that learning is achieved. There are three components to our work in this area:

SATISFACTORY COMPLETION POLICY

The Satisfactory Completion policy has been implemented in Semester 1 to ensure that if a student does not satisfactorily complete an assessment task (achieve 50%) then they are given the opportunity to have a second attempt (redemption) to reach that standard. If a student still does not satisfactorily complete the task further supports are put in place to assist them.

PROGRESS REPORTS

We report every 3 weeks as to how learning is progressing. This means that a student's progress can be closely followed to track improvement or provide interventions where progress is of a concern.

NEW REPORT TEMPLATE

A new report template has been developed to compliment the Satisfactory Completion Policy and Progress Reports so that there is a clear understanding of the learning outcomes of every student.

SCHOOL WIDE POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR SUPPORT (SWPBS)

SWPBS is a program used in many schools to establish the social culture and behavioural supports needed for a school to be an effective learning environment for all students. The focus is on

- Preventing poor behaviour
- Defining and teaching positive social expectations
- Acknowledging positive behavior, teaching and catching kids getting it right rather than waiting for them to get it wrong
- Having consistent responses for problem behaviour
- Collecting and using of data to inform decision-making
- Providing a range of intensive, individual intervention supports
- Implementing systems that support effective practices
- Shifting the emphasis from punishing to teaching and learning
- Focusing on the school making small changes for biggest effects
- Using everyday interactions for learning
- Considering the physical environment and routines that kids work and play in

This program has been in place for a number of years and is being reviewed. We are especially keen to get feedback from the students on how the program can be improved.

TERM 2 ACTIVITIES

Term 2 has been another busy one. We started with the College Open Day, quickly followed by NAPLAN. There has been a lot of interschool sport and excursions, music performances, the Year 9 camp to Ace Hi Ranch, Year 10 and 11 exams, the GAT and rehearsals for School of Rock.

Student Voice has been another of our priorities this term. Individual meetings with students and conversations about their progress have been taking place on all campuses

A lot of extra work goes into all these activities and I would like to thank the Campus Principals and their staff for their efforts this term.

Dear Parents/Guardians and students,

It has been a very exciting time at the Essendon campus with the completion of the hall building upgrade project. The upgrade mainly focussed on the upstairs hall delivering a flexible space that is suitable for a variety of uses. The venue has state of the art theatre equipment to showcase our performing arts. It has been used as an exam centre, the reverse cycle air-conditioning, acoustic tiles, modern facilities are a huge improvement on the previous conditions. We held our end of semester assembly on Thursday 13th of June to celebrate student achievement and endeavour. We showcased the variety of ways the venue can be used – as a performance venue, a movie theatre, a lecture theatre, a

function / conference centre. Over the next two months we will be restoring the front façade and ground floor rooms. Congratulation to Elle and Andrew Fraser on the birth of Angus Xander.

Student learning has been a key focus this semester with the introduction of the Satisfactory Completion Policy and a focus on improving student outcomes. We have encouraged all students to exceed their potential. We developed a program that prepares students in year 10, 11 and 12 for the General Achievement Test (GAT). We have improved student access to online resources with all classes accessing google classroom and year 11 and 12 students also have access to Edrolo. Edrolo is an online platform that provides a variety of resources to increase student understanding and consolidate their learning. I would like to thank all staff and students for their efforts this term and encourage everyone to reflect on their learning strategies and set achievable goals for Semester two.

We are fine tuning the details for our end of year exam and orientation programs and dates will be published early in term 3. The orientation program is compulsory and class work and assessments for the 2020 courses will be covered during this time. It is vital all students attend and complete the required work ready for Semester 1 next year. Students who do not attend will be required to attend redemption sessions at the beginning of term 1 next year. Overall, the camp was a great experience. The staff made us feel comfortable and safe while we were there and we are glad that we had the opportunity to go and enjoy ourselves.










GIRLS IN S.T.E.M.
