# Careers Update December 2020

Good luck to the 2020 Year 12 cohort who are now moving on to the next phase of their lives. It is very pleasing to see that a number of our students have already been employed as Apprentices in various Trade areas. The majority of our Year 12 students are planning to head on to further study at University or TAFE Institutions in 2021. For those students the upcoming 'Change of Preference' period (Dec 30<sup>th</sup> to Jan 4<sup>th</sup>) is a very important time.

After students get their results on the 30<sup>th</sup> of December they have a 6-day window to make any final changes to their VTAC preferences before the first round of offers. Mr Kingham will be available during this change of preference period to assist students.

### Work Experience – Year 10 and 11

The Year 10 Work Experience program is planned to go ahead as normal next year during the last two weeks of Term 2. We strongly encourage students to try to get a placement secured before the end of the year, or alternatively use the summer break to find a placement. Congratulations to those students who have already found one. Many places are still not advertising 2021 Work Experience positions, but we expect that to change in the coming months. Students should check in regularly to the Year 10 Careers / Work Experience Google Classroom for links to various employers



Next year, we are also planning to give the Year 11 students the opportunity to take part in one week of Work Experience. Unfortunately, due to COVID these students missed out on undertaking Work Experience this year. This was a shame as many students had organised some really good placements. For Year 11 students it will be optional meaning only students who really want to do a placement will be doing it. There is no set time that this placement has to occur, it will up to the student to organise a placement and make sure it doesn't clash with important assessment tasks. Those of you who had organised a really good placement for this year may be able to do that planned placement in 2021. Michele Hamilton and I will be able to create Work Experience contracts for students but it will be up to the student to initially organise the placement.



### **Year 9 Morrisby Careers Assessment**

Career Education is being strongly encouraged to begin at an earlier age these days.

Next year as well as all Year 9's completing a yearly Career Action Plan, they will be undertaking a thorough Careers Assessment called Morrisby during Term 2. This will involve a series of quizzes and questions and then a one on one interview from a trained Career Consultant. This will help students have a much greater understanding about the careers they may be suited to.

### **Strengthening Vocational and Applied Learning for School Students**

The Victorian Government has announced a \$38 million investment to create a new single Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) that will give students flexibility to combine academic and applied learning in line with their interests, strengths and career aspirations.

The new single VCE senior secondary certificate will mean students no longer have to choose between doing VCE or VCAL. This will start to be implemented from 2023.

The move to a single certificate follows a review by former Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority CEO John Firth that found the change would provide all Victorian students with the best opportunity to develop both academic and practical vocational skills.

The review found evidence of outstanding programs across the State but that more needed to be done to ensure all young people had access to the training that engages them, delivers high demand skills and leads to quality jobs.

Our School will receive funding for a Jobs, Skills and Pathways Coordinator to support the delivery of our vocational and applied learning programs. Their job will be to provide advice and support for students choosing vocational and applied learning programs. They will also work with training providers and employers to ensure that students get the most out of their learning and training.

Our school will also have access to a Jobs, Skills and Pathways Manager to provide practical support to our school to deliver high quality vocational and applied learning programs.

Work has started and will continue in 2021 to support the introduction of a new vocational specialist pathway in the VCE.

The integration of a vocational and applied learning pathway within the VCE will offer high-quality pathways for all students so they are better prepared for lifelong learning and can transition more smoothly through school, further education or training and work.

Students currently completing VCAL or VET will not be affected by these changes. This includes students undertaking VET as part of their VCE. The new Vocational Specialist Pathway, embedded within the VCE will commence in 2023, and a fully integrated certificate will commence in 2025.

Students can continue to commence VCAL in 2021 and 2022. Transition plans will ensure all students enrolled in VCAL will be able to complete their Senior Secondary Certificate.

Further information and advice about the transition to the new Vocational Specialist Pathway for students will be provided to you in 2021.

### **Tutor learning initiative: Information for Parents, Carers and Families**

This information is for parents, carers and guardians about the Tutor Learning Initiative, which will support students in their learning in 2021.

The 2020 school year has been an extraordinary and challenging one for every school community. Many Victorian students spent much of Terms 2 and 3 this year learning remotely and Victorian schools and their communities have made an exceptional effort to provide continuity of teaching and learning to our students during this time.

During Term 4, schools across Victoria have been focused on supporting students' mental health and wellbeing, in addition to assisting students to readjust to on-site learning. Teachers have also been focusing on assessing student learning, addressing individual learning gaps and identifying those students who need extra support for their learning, using classroom-based observation and assessments.

We know that the remote learning experience was different for every student. While some students thrived, some students may not have engaged as fully with remote learning. For most of our students, regular high-quality teaching in 2021 will be enough to help them progress to the expected level of learning. Some students will benefit from additional intensive learning support in 2021.

As you may be aware, in response to this, the Victorian Government is investing \$250 million in the Tutor Learning Initiative to enable schools across Victoria to engage around 4,100 teachers as tutors in 2021 to support students who need extra assistance with their learning. Schools will determine how this initiative is best implemented for their students and will ensure that students will get this support in a way that minimises disruptions to other learning or school activities.

By engaging additional teachers to support children with intensive learning, classroom teachers will have greater capacity to ensure that all other students' achievement, engagement and wellbeing needs are met, so that all students receive the support they need in 2021.

Further information about the Tutor Learning Initiative, and how it will be implemented for students who need individual learning support in our school, will be issued before students begin tutoring in 2021. During Term 4, schools will be working with students to understand their experience of remote learning and their return to onsite schooling.



They were not perturbed by the Covid-19 restrictions and regulations imposed, settling for the fact that Campus celebrations couldn't be as elaborate as they usually were and exercising their social responsibility nevertheless. They organised and ran events supporting various foundations and organisations demonstrating the ability to overcome obstacles to achieve their goals. Some of these included Harmony Day, selling Remembrance Day Poppies for our local RSL and Kick for Kids Sports Day in support of the Starlight Foundation.

R U OK? Day went ahead online this year. Student Leadership coordinated a video montage where they delivered their messages of support and positivity. This montage was played at the whole online school assembly where students sported their yellow attire and/or accessories and participated in an EKC specific Kahoot which was aimed at having fun whilst promoting messages and strategies of mental health and wellbeing. Prizes were awarded for best dressed as well as the winners of the Kahoot.

### **Addressing Student Needs/ Promoting Community**

During Lockdown and online lessons Student Leaders felt their number one priority was to look after their community by keeping everyone connected. They offered students various opportunities to connect virtually online. They also created student surveys to ascertain the needs of their peers during online learning. Student voice was loud and clear allowing student leaders to receive and provide teaching staff with feedback so student needs were addressed.

One such initiative was running the MMM –Monday Mental Meets which was a weekly lunchtime Google meet offering all students a safe place to visit virtually and simply hang out, socialise or voice any concerns. The Google meets drew students from every year level as well as Teachers. Amongst the most memorable meets were meets where students jammed by sharing their music compositions with each other or where

students shared art works they had created whilst in lock down. Some meets even turned into gaming sessions where students delighted in defeating teachers in a virtual world that was quickly becoming all too familiar to everyone. I'm so grateful to the Teachers and Students who gave up their lunchtimes to help run these meets although I believe it was beneficial to both organisers and participators as it was a great opportunity to socially connect outside of class time.

Other initiatives such as a Trick Shot Challenge and the ISO Life Photo Competition Challenge during Term 2 were also introduced to promote community. Student Leaders also decided to celebrate World Chocolate Day in October by introducing a Chocolate Master Chef challenge. Students showcased their cooking/ baking skills and the entries were indeed worthy enough for Master Chef!

The student leaders also created a toilet roll throwing montage for the end of Term 3 Assembly in the spirit of COVID 19 Lockdowns demonstrating their ability to stay connected and still have a laugh in the face of challenging situations.

Finally, our Student Leaders worked tirelessly to give our Year 9 students the farewell they deserved as their time on the Niddrie Campus came to an end. It was also an opportunity to celebrate overcoming what was such a challenging year.

As restrictions eased our intended Outdoor Soiree changed to an Indoor Celebration where the School Gym was transformed into a function area complete with festive decorations, white tablecloths, table centre pieces, mementos for each student, even a photo corner with funny props and a sit down lunch was made possible.

In a year like no other, I would like to congratulate our Student Leadership team's efforts.
