

Academics

Our VCE students were fortunate enough to have the option to participate in University Experience Days at Melbourne University and La Trobe University. These days give students invaluable exposure to the opportunities that Universities provide and the pathway options they can consider at the conclusion of their VCE studies. In line with this our Year 12 VCE students participated in an Elevate Study Program session on campus. Delivered by University students who scored 90+ ATARs in their final year of schooling, the program gave students a guide to study and revision techniques for both in the classroom and at home. As a result, during our Mentoring Program, all students have been provided with Study Planners to assist their time management in the lead up to major assessments and exams. These are available for students to download weekly on the Year Level Google Classrooms. These sessions complemented our next SWPBS goal for the term "Strive for Academic Excellence".

Programs

Many of our students represented the College in sports at Inter School level. Congratulations to those involved in our AFL, Netball, Basketball and Soccer programs. A further congratulations to the students who were involved in leading the campus's IDAHOBIT activities in May, including the launch of our Rainbow Group. Our Art Therapy group culminated their program with spray painting designs which highlighted the skills they developed across the sessions with art therapist Cilla. In amongst this, students involved in the Production have been busy in after school rehearsals in preparation for their August performances.



The attendance rates for exam week were over 95% indicating how important the exams are to students and their academic progress.

Camp





VTAC and SEAS Applications for Year 12 Students

From Monday August 1st (week 4 of Term 3), students will be able to create their VTAC accounts, apply for tertiary courses, apply for SEAS (special consideration), and also start undertaking scholarship applications. Year 12 students will be assisted with this process during their study sessions throughout Term 3.

Students can refer to updated Course Guides recently posted to the Year 11/12 Careers Google Classroom. They can also continue to search for their preferred courses via the VTAC Course Search website. Students should keep in mind the special entry schemes available to EKC students such as Latrobe Aspire and RMIT SNAP.

Any students wanting to apply for SEAS due to Disadvantaged Financial Background, Disability / Medical Condition or other Difficult Circumstances need to meet with Student Welfare Coordinator Ms Bianchin.




University / TAFE Open Days

Most students will have their one-on-one interviews with qualified careers consultants early in Term 3. Due to Morrisby staffing shortages, some of these interviews will take place later in the semester. Work Experience & Structured Workplace Learning

It has been great to have more of an uninterrupted year with COVID meaning students have had greater opportunities to be able to attend Work Experience and Structured Workplace Learning (VCAL). Our Year 10 students and our Year 11/12 VCAL students have been able to get out and gain some valuable experience in the workforce. For our VCAL students, some of these placements are expected to translate in ongoing apprenticeships / employment. Many of our students have really been in their element in the workforce and feedback from employers has generally been really positive.




Latrobe University Experience – Sophia Lima (Year 12)

The Year 12 students this year have been lucky enough to be guided around many different university campuses thus far. One of them being La Trobe University. After an exceptional tour of campus, students were given the opportunity to be grouped to a workshop for law or anatomy. The group for anatomy I chose to follow. This experience was once in a lifetime, able to get close and personal with the body parts of individuals who donated their organs and such to science. Our personal mentor gave us an opportunity to learn about the importance of science today, honouring those who have given us the privilege to discover amazing things about the body and why they happen. Students who volunteered, were able to handle a real brain! This experience we will remember when the time arrives to pick our pathways for universities, and all of us are extremely grateful to be given the campus tour.



Work Experience Reflection – Trent Doehmann (Year 10) New Edge Studio

Finally the first day of work experience arrived. Driving up to the industrial park where the office of the Design Studio, NEW Edge, is located, I had to control feelings of nervousness and excitement - I was about to begin a 2 week experience of working life. A friendly receptionist greeted me and it began. A small group of people were already working hard as I walked into the office, but they took the time to introduce themselves to me one by one, making me feel welcomed immediately. Then, I was shown what would be my work desk for the 2 weeks. A sample floor plan of a house was sitting on the desk waiting for me. It was an introduction into the designing world of Architecture. I was given access to AutoCAD, the computer program they use to design projects, and I was given an assignment. I had to design my dream house but with some requirements and restrictions. The size of the land was given, the amount of bedrooms, distance from the house to the boundaries of the land, minimum size of the garage and other requirements. I carefully listened to what I was being asked to do and began "working". A little while later, I met my employer. He approached us (I was there with another EKC student) and introduced himself. He welcomed us warmly and expressed his hope that we settled in well which we assured him we did. Before I knew it, it was lunchtime. It came upon us very quickly because each hour we had to stand up from our desks to do some stretches. The company is very conscious of the health of their employees. The lunchroom was downstairs, where we sat down to eat the food we had brought. The whole team stopped at the same time to eat and we all sat together talking about random things and getting to know each other. I was very happy to be among such a friendly group of people from whom I could learn about possible education pathways to reach my career goals. After lunch, we all went back to work but for myself and my schoolmate, knock off time was only an hour away. Before we knew it, the work day ended and we were on our way home, looking forward to tomorrow.




Work Experience Report – Tegan Anderson & Madi Knowles

In the app development stage, students used a new coding platform to create a proof of concept app giving them the skills required to utilise this technology in the future.



