Students who demonstrate these behaviours in class are given a Real Reward and often a Positive Acknowledgement post on Compass which has been well received by parents. Our SWPBS goals for Term 4 will include: Set & Evaluate Learning Goals, Encourage & Support Others, Strive for Academic Excellence, Work cooperatively with peers and staff.




ACADEMICS

This term, our VCE students were fortunate enough to have the option to participate in the Elevate Study Skill Programs. While the Year 12s were involved in one session in Term 2, the Year 11s were this time given the opportunity to hear from young people who have recently finished their secondary school journey and who all achieved 90+ ATARs. They shared strategies around managing time, how to revise and study effectively and prioritising and balancing schoolwork with everyday life. The feedback students provided was overwhelmingly positive. Students across the campus are regularly provided with hard and electronic copies of Study Planners to help them with the balance and map out their study, homework, and revision. These sessions were fantastic in supporting the students with their assessments in term 3. Many of our Year 11 VCAL students have been involved in projects around the school including removal of Cricket Nets, revamping the stage and painting areas of the school. They have shown great initiative in forwarding their proposals, costs, and their work ethic. A variety of curriculum excursions have taken place this term which you'll hear about later in the newsletter.

PROGRAMS

Once again, we had several students involved in interschool sports. Congratulations to the students who participated in the sports opportunities offered. In particular we had several students who progressed to the Western Metropolitan Region Athletics Finals. We were again fortunate enough to have our Art Therapist running a program onsite. Students enjoyed designing and making skateboards and various other pieces of art. Ski Camp was enjoyed by students from all year levels, despite the weather conditions! The College Production 'Charlie & The Chocolate Factory' was a highlight at the campus this term. So many hours and so much dedication went into the performances which



were backed up by the Senior Soiree. We marked RUOK? Day at the Campus with students wearing a touch of yellow and sports gear. During the day we had a Teachers Vs Students soccer match and Basketball Free Throw Competition. The Year 9 students from Niddrie & East Keilor also joined us for an afternoon at Essendon as they begin their transition to the Senior Campus.



EXAMS

We also had students who are enrolled in a Unit 3/4 subject and Year 12 VCAL students undertake the new format of the General Achievement Test (GAT). Students were provided with both in-class advice and support in the lead up, as well as a lecture from The English Lab's Ben Taylor who went through examples with the students. Sat over 2 sessions, this was a great preparation for students in anticipation of their end of year exams. On Parent Teacher Interview Day, Year 12 students also had the opportunity to sit a 3-hour practice English exam. This year we have a 4-day Holiday Practice Exam program for students to help prepare them for their final assessments.

COURSE COUNSELLING & VTAC

A major feature of Term 3 is subject selection. For year 10s, this means selecting their VCE subjects, and for our year 11 students, finalising their subjects before post-secondary school. With the introduction of the VCEVM in 2023, students have quite a lot of flexibility. The Course Selection Process allowed parents to be involved. Each student had a one-on-one course advice session with a member of the team. Year 12



have submitted their VTAC course preferences and had additional support to complete various applications to support their University, TAFE, and employment options.

SENIOR SCHOOL FORMAL



Year 12

Year 12 students have been carefully considering their VTAC course preferences in order to apply for various Degree and Diploma courses at various tertiary institutions. RMIT and Latrobe have been popular with our students this year, with a number of students applying for the Latrobe Aspire program. Many students have been looking at other options such as apprenticeships, traineeships, or employment. - All students applying via VTAC need to make sure they carefully check their **Course Selection Requirements**, as there may be additional requirements that must be completed by a certain date (e.g. a test, a folio, an audition, an interview etc). Failure to meet the deadline for these means students may no longer be eligible for selection into their desired course.
- **SEAS and VTAC Scholarships** must be finalised by **October 7th**

- Students applying for Teaching / Education courses (and also Nursing at VU) are required register for, and sit complete the **CASPer test**.

NURSING / MIDWIFERY Funding Announcement

You may have already heard on the news, but the Vic Govt has announced that it will be making Nursing and Midwifery Degrees free for next year.

What does this actually mean?

The normal cost of a Nursing Bachelor Degree is around \$16500 for 3 years. For students undertaking Nursing next year, the Govt have pledged to pay \$9000 to each student, and a further \$7500 if you work in the public health system for two years after graduating.

FREE TAFE

The Government are still offering their FREE TAFE program for priority courses in lots of different areas of skill shortage. There are a large number of non-apprenticeship and apprenticeship courses in a variety of areas. More info can be found here:





There has been some important learning and growth happening in English this term. It has been great to see Keilor Campus students really stepping up and rising to the challenges that the term has brought. Year 7 students in particular have shown significant improvement and resilience as they have undertaken an in-depth text study of the novel, *Runner*. This exciting text has seen students complete their first text response essay and it has been pleasing to see students making improvements to their writing and tackling this fundamental skill. Year 7 Students will have the opportunity to consolidate their knowledge of *Runner* through an exciting excursion to the Old Melbourne Gaol and the Melbourne Museum during week 1 of term 4. Full details can be found on Compass - **please note the Keilor students will need to be at school for an 8.30AM bus departure.**

Year 8 students have also undertaken a Novel study of *Iqbal* and been extended in their essay writing skills. Year 9 students crafted personal narratives about "an experience that shaped you as a person". Students drafted a text with a particular emphasis on engaging an audience through vocabulary and storytelling techniques. The final part of this assessment required students to deliver their narratives to an audience. It was great to see so many students in 9A and 9B stand up in front of their peers to share their powerful narratives in the style of a TED or Moth Talk. Many students went above and beyond and achieved their best marks yet for this challenging task.
