
TERM 3 NEWSLETTER



Welcome to this term's edition of our newsletter!

It has been a busy and exciting term at Essendon Keilor College, with plenty to celebrate across our campuses. Please take the time to read about the fantastic achievements of our students throughout this issue.

This term we completed our external School Review, which offered valuable insights into our progress and future direction. In the coming weeks, we look forward to sharing the new strategic goals that will guide our 2026-2029 Strategic Plan, ensuring we continue to deliver the best possible learning outcomes and environment for our students.

Our NAPLAN results this year showed significant growth for our Year 9 students, particularly in reading and numeracy.

This achievement reflects the dedication of both students and teachers and highlights the impact of our ongoing focus on improving learning outcomes.

The data below shows the three-year trend averages, where our current Year 9, 10, and 11 students have performed well above similar schools in both measures, and above the State average. This demonstrates that our students are continuing to make strong growth in the key learning areas of reading and numeracy, as we consistently strive for positive outcomes across the college.

While I highlighted this achievement in our mid-term update, I want to again acknowledge and celebrate the students and staff involved in this wonderful showcase. We are incredibly proud of their talent, hard work, and commitment.

The class of 2025

For our Class of 2025, Year 12 students are now finalising their VCE and VM coursework, with VCE students preparing for exams and all graduates getting ready for the next stage of their journeys beyond secondary school. We are proud of their commitment, resilience, and determination during this important time.

As we approach the end-of-year VCAA exams, we are working hard to support our students in their preparation. Early in Term 4, we will conduct Unit 3 & 4 trial exams, followed by Connect Education revision lectures, providing students with the tools they need to excel. It is imperative our students engage with the Connect lectures and use this upcoming term break to study and revise key concepts in preparation for the exams.

In facilities news, our Master Plan Project continues to progress, with schematic design now underway for the development of new Learning Hubs at the Niddrie campus. The purpose of this planning is to position the College to seek funding in partnership with our local member and Minister for Education, Ben Carroll, as part of the 2026 State Budget capital works commitments.

We are also continuing to invest in the facilities at our Senior Campus, with a new STEM space scheduled to open on the timetable from the beginning of Term 4 and our front of school project nearing completion.

To date, we have received \$2.26 million of investment through the Victorian School Building Authority (VSBA) Planned Maintenance Program. This funding has supported the modernisation of buildings and addressed a range of maintenance priorities. I am also pleased to share that our student toilets at the Essendon Campus will be modernised as part of further funding commitments in the near future.

These projects will ensure our students have access to modern, flexible learning spaces that support both academic success and student wellbeing.

At this stage, we do not have any further information regarding the outcome of the independent exploration into the East Keilor campus. We expect to receive a recommendation for 2026 and beyond in the near future and will update our school community as soon as this information becomes available.

I want to take this opportunity to once again thank our dedicated team of staff at the College, who continue to strive for the best possible learning, engagement, and wellbeing outcomes for our students. Our goal is for students to have experiences at school that not only support their academic growth but also allow them to explore and engage in their areas of passion, setting them up to thrive both now and into the future.

I would like to wish our students and families all the very best for the term break and if your team is still in the AFL finals race, good luck!

We look forward to welcoming everyone back at the beginning of Term 4 on Monday 6 October.

STUDENT SAFETY BEFORE AND AFTER SCHOOL SUPERVISION

Student safety at Essendon Keilor College is our highest priority and the safe and appropriate supervision of students is an important element of our duty of care to students. Part of this duty is ensuring parents and students are aware of our student supervision arrangements before and after school.

Before school: School grounds are supervised by staff moving through the grounds **from 8:30am**. Direct teacher supervision allocated to **key bus stop areas occurs from 8:40am**.

After school: The main campus bus stop areas are supervised until 3:15pm

Students on school grounds outside these times will not be supervised (unless they are attending a campus breakfast club on the designated day).

Parents/carers are requested to ensure that students do not attend school outside of these supervised times unless they are attending a before or after school extra curricular activity such as sports training.

Even though Term 3 has only been 9 weeks long, it has been jampacked with enrichment and extra-curricular opportunities for our middle years students. In particular, I wanted to take a moment to highlight our school production Matilda the Musical, where over 60% of the cast and crew were made up of students from the middle years, in particular, students from the Year 8 cohort across both campuses. A true demonstration of leading from the middle! I can't wait to see this cohort continue to fly as they transition into the top of the middle years. When young people are engaged in positive things they are passionate about and connected to, you get to see them shine. Our 2025 production was an amazing example of this. I applaud all of the students involved for taking up this positive opportunity and congratulate them, along with Ms Maudlin and Ms Steele, on producing such a high-quality show.

Term 3 has continued to see a big focus on pathways and transition for our Year 9 students. Through the support of our Later Years Information Evening, our Later Years Subject Expo, and Morrisby careers interviews, students have been able to make some really informed decisions about their subjects for Year 10, with many electing to challenge themselves with an early access VCE subject as part of their program. I want to thank all Year 9 parents for your high level of engagement through this key part of the Year 9 into Year 10 transition. Your support ensures the three-way partnership between students, parents, and the school—which we know leads to the best outcomes for our students.

Since the Term 2 newsletter, NAPLAN comparison data has become available, allowing us to see the impact we are having on the learning outcomes for our students compared to similar schools, network schools, and the rest of the state. We understand that when students transition to us from primary school, they are each at different stages along their learning journey. Our aim as a school is to ensure we see learning growth for all students, no matter their starting point. I'm pleased to share that, once again, our NAPLAN growth data shows that over 70% of our students are experiencing medium to high growth when comparing their results from Year 7 to Year 9. These results are in line with similar and network schools for Numeracy, and above similar schools, network schools, and the state for Reading.

In my key address to students through end-of-term assemblies, I have been asking them to consider what actions they need to start, stop, or continue to set themselves up for success and a strong finish to 2025. As a school leadership team, it's important that we continue to set high expectations all the way through to the end of the year, as every day at school and every learning opportunity counts towards growth potential for our students. I look forward to seeing how many middle years students rise to my challenge of achieving a GPA of 4 in Term 4.

I hope all students and families enjoy some quality time together over the next two weeks, and I look forward to seeing students return rejuvenated and ready for a big Term 4.

LATER YEARS (10-12)



As term 3 concludes I want to acknowledge the work students across all yer levels at the Later Years campus have put in across the last 9 weeks. After receiving their mid year semester reports, students have shown the ability to reflect on areas for improvement and put actions in place to progress their learning, while also celebrating the successes.

For our Year 12 students, the classwork and school assessed coursework section of their schooling has come to an end. They now set their sights on the final VCAA examination period beginning in October. Year 12 teachers have done extensive analysis of student results to determine ways they can best help prepare their students for these exams. It is important to reitrate the partnership between the school, student and family in preparing and managing students during what can be a stressful time for some. Our EKC Student and Parent Exam Study and Revision 2025 booklet provides students with

tangible and proven study strategies and techniques and parents with ways to support their child at home. A copy can be found on compass and hard copies are in the Study Centre for students to use. Our Exam Preparation Masterclasses will take place onsite in week 1 of the holiday period and the study centre will be open each day for students to study away from any potential distractions or for pre-arranged group study sessions. On return to the campus in Term 4, students undertaking VCAA exams will take part in the Practice Exam series on 6th and 7th October and will attend Connect Revision Lectures onsite from Monday 20th October. We are confident all of these experiences and opportunities will provide students with a strong foundation to position them well during the exam period to maximise their success.

Our year 10 and 11 students have had an extensive process of selecting their VCE subjects for 2026. Significant thought and support has gone into this process, including our Subject Expo and parent information evening which was incredibly well attended by parents and students. The breakout sessions provided parents and students to discover more in-depth information about some of our specialist programs, and it was wonderful to welcome the year 9 students and families to the campus for the evening, as well as for their course counselling interviews.

Term 4 will bring new challenges for our year 10 and 11 students as they embark of 5 weeks of learning and revision, before comencing their Unit 2 and Semester 2 exams. These 5 weeks will be crucial for students to display the learning behaviours and qualities that will set them up for success. In particular, having equipment organised in their lockers so they are prepared for learning, asking questions and seeking feedback from their teachers, and revising content at home, beyond the homework set.

I'm sure you will enjoy the content in this term's newsletter, highlighting the fantastic programs and experiences our students have had during Term 3. I wish all families and students a safe and restful break and look forward to welcoming students back to the campus on Monday 6th October.

RESPECTFUL RELATIONSHIPS

Respectful relationships education is fundamental at Essendon Keilor College. It supports students to develop the knowledge, attitudes and skills needed for respectful relationships and helps to build respect, equality and inclusivity across the entire school community. Research tells us that providing Respectful Relationships education at school can lead to positive impacts on students' academic outcomes, their mental health, classroom behaviour and relationships.

EKC uses the Department of Education's evidence-based teaching and learning resources to teach our students about Respectful Relationships from Year 7-12, as well as provide a range of incursions to complement classroom activities. Please see below a list of incursions and activities that our students have taken part in this term as part of the program.

YEAR 7 - CONSENT FOUNDATIONS

The year 7 students came together from both campus to participate in an incursion focused on affirmative consent and respectful relationships. The session encouraged students to understand consent as an ongoing, enthusiastic "yes," and to think about the different factors that can influence someone's ability to give or receive consent. They also discussed the role of body language in communication, while learning that it should never be relied upon on its own.

The program explored the importance of boundaries in all kinds of relationships—whether friendships, family connections, or intimate relationships—and how these boundaries can shift over time and experiences. They also developed skills in hearing and responding to a clear "no" in ways that help others feel safe, respected, and supported.

The students will continue to explore 'consent' and the laws around consent and intimate relationships in the focus groups sessions. It is also important to continue to have these conversations at home.



YEAR 8 - TOOLBOX EDUCATION (MENTAL MOVIES)

Our Year 8 students recently took part in an engaging incursion delivered by Toolbox Education, focused on managing thoughts and emotions. This session helped students recognise when their mind has taken over and taught them practical strategies to return to the present moment.

Throughout the workshop, students explored defusion strategies to unhook from anxious thoughts, learned how to reframe unhelpful stories their brain might be telling them, and practised simple grounding techniques to bring their attention back to the here-and-now. These valuable skills equip our students with tools to reduce stress, build resilience, and stay focused on what really matters in both their learning and everyday lives.

The year 8 students were really positive about the program and shared that they learnt some very valuable skills. The programs run by Toolbox Education will be extended into all year levels as part of the RRRR program next year.

TOOLBOX

YEAR 9 - ELEPHANT ED

Our Year 9 students recently participated in an important incursion delivered by Elephant Ed titled Porn v Reality. The session encouraged students to critically analyse the differences between pornography and real-life, healthy relationships. Students explored the unrealistic messages that pornography often promotes and discussed how these can create harmful expectations about bodies, consent, and intimacy.

Through open, age-appropriate conversations, the program emphasised the importance of respect, communication, and consent in building healthy relationships. This session gave our students the opportunity to challenge myths, ask questions, and develop a clearer understanding of what positive, elephanted respectful relationships look like in real life.



This topic was further explored in follow-up focus groups, where students discussed the laws around pornography and its impact on young people. While school provides a safe space for these conversations, it is equally important that families continue them at home. Parents and carers play a vital role in guiding safe online behaviour and reinforcing healthy, respectful relationships.

YEAR 10 - MAT MAN PORGRAM

During this term a small group of Year 10 boys participated in the Mat Man program. The aim of the program is to grow the ability of participants to self-regulate and to develop a personal tool-kit to manage their own lives as young men including challenging outdated gender norms. The program focused on supporting positive aspects of masculinity and recognising the positive contribution that young men can bring to their communities.









YEAR 10 - CREATIVE ART THERAPY

This term, a small group of Year 10 girls participated in Art Therapy sessions. Cilla, the facilitator adopted an "open studio" approach, providing a more open and flexible format empowering students to choose the art materials they work with. The group were supported to build positive relationships with other participants to work towards developing a stronger sense of themselves and by extension, their relationship to school.

The sessions also supported students to:

- Develop self-care skills and coping strategies, including mindfulness and positive self-talk
- Building resilience and positive mental health
- Improving confidence and self-esteem
- Develop emotional literacy, awareness and regulation;
- Explore and understand peer dynamics and friendship issues;
- Develop and extend problem-solving skills





YEAR 11 - ELEPHANT ED: POWER IN RELATIONSHIPS

Elephant Ed is a leading consent and respectful relationships education provider to more than 500 schools around Australia. Elephant Ed's workshops are evidence-based, age-appropriate and mapped to State and National curriculum guidelines. The power and relationships workshop covered the following areas:

- Prevention strategies that emphasise collective responsibility and encourage bystander intervention
- Seeking help and supporting peers
- Overview of statistics relating to prevalence of relationship violence in Australia
- Exploring the drivers of relationship violence, including gender and power imbalances in relationships





YEAR 11 - VIS X BLACK DOG MENTAL FITNESS

Year 11 students had the opportunity to participate in a new mental fitness program that is run through the Australian Institute of Sport and the Black Dog Institute. It is a free interactive program for high school students that is delivered by elite athletes who have been trained to share their experiences with young people. The program is designed to help them recognise the strategies they can implement to help improve mental health and wellbeing for themselves and their friends.

The presenter for the session was Domenic Frederico, a rowing scholarship holder with the VIS. Domenic ran students through the following key areas:

- The importance of mental fitness
- Recognising how social connection can positively or negatively impact mental fitness
- Identifying strategies to build positive social connections with others
- Recognising signs that a friend is/might be struggling with their mental health
- Identifying ways to help a friend who might be struggling with their mental health
- Identifying steps to start a conversation with a friend you are concerned about
- Identifying resources to support their own and others mental health and wellbeing



YEAR 12 - ELEVATE EDUCATION: FINISHING LINE / ACE YOUR EXAMS WORKSHOPS

Year 12 VCE students undertook workshops with Elevate Education to help them prepare for the final stretch of their schooling. The high-energy sessions focused on working towards finalising Unit 4 coursework as well as preparing for end of Year exams. There were lots of key messages communicated to students including:

- Stress management techniques and wellbeing
- The role of study groups in preparing for exams
- Identifying weaknesses leading into assessments
- Study routines for holidays and leading into exam periods
- Highest value exam preparation tasks
- Fixing mistakes to ensure constant improvement
- Time allocation during exam preparation
- Techniques for managing stress and time pressure in exams

MIDDLE YEARS SCIENCE

What an exciting term of Science in the Middle Years!

This term, our Year 7 students were introduced to the fundamentals of Chemistry. They participated in a range of hands-on practicals exploring the particle model and investigating methods of separating mixtures. Year 8 students delved into Earth Science, where they explored the formation of rocks. Their studies included modelling the rock cycle and the layers of the Earth—with varying degrees of creative success!

Meanwhile, our Year 9 students completed their Chemistry unit, taking a deeper look into different types of chemical reactions and the science behind them.

To celebrate Science Week, our Year 7 HAP class visited the Royal Botanic Gardens for an introduction to the Plants for Space program. Year 8 HAP students took their exploration further with a visit to La Trobe University, where they worked in university laboratories to deepen their understanding of space agricultural research.

To cap off the celebrations, many classes explored the fascinating chemical reaction involved when eating sherbet — an experiment that was both educational and delicious!













YEAR 12 CHEMISTRY EXCURSION VSSEC QUALITY CONTROL LABORATORY DAY

Our Year 12 Chemistry students had the opportunity to attend a full-day excursion to the Victorian Space Science Education Centre (VSSEC) for their Quality Control Program. This was a hands-on learning experience designed to deepen their understanding of several advanced analytical techniques central to their VCE Chemistry curriculum. Over the course of the day, students worked as a group to undergo qualitative analysis of aviation fuel samples and medicines using high-tech equipment found in science laboratories. Students explored topics to support understanding of the content but also got valuable experience in a real lab setting and made connections to the pharmaceutical industry and industrial impact on the environment. It was also great to see students asking insightful questions! Our students returned inspired, with new skills and a clearer picture of what a career in chemistry or related fields might look like!


YR 8 ITALIAN EXCURSION - CALABRIA CLUB


KEY THINGS FOR YEAR 12's TO CONSIDER:

- All students applying via VTAC need to make sure they carefully check their Course Selection Requirements, as there may be additional requirements that must be completed by a certain date (e.g. a test, a folio, an audition, an interview etc).
 Failure to meet the deadline for these means students may no longer be eligible for selection into their desired course.
- Students should regularly check their **VTAC email account** to avoid missing important info.
- Students need to ensure they have paid their VTAC Application fee of \$80 prior to September 29th in order to avoid a late fee.
- Access and Equity (VTAC SEAS and Scholarships) must be finalised by October 10th.
- Students applying for Teaching / Education Bachelor Degrees (not pathways courses) are required register for, and complete the CASPer test. https://acuityinsights.app/casper/






YR 10 VU EXPERIENCE DAY

Overall, RUOK? Day celebrations were a fun and inclusive week with many enjoyable activities.















Know Your Options



Where to Get Care Without Going to Hospital

Victorian emergency departments are experiencing high demand, and lengthening wait times for patients with non-life-threatening illnesses and injuries.

It's important that members of our community receive timely care in the right place.

There are a range of healthcare services available to assist people with non-urgent injuries and illnesses, before they need to consider presenting at a hospital.

GPs

There are many general practitioners located across Victoria, with dozens in some areas alone. Many offer bulk billing, particularly for children. It's worth taking the time to call around and check who has availability.

Nurse on Call

For free professional health advice, call **1300 60 60 24**. Nurse-on-Call connects you with a registered nurse who provides caring, expert advice any time of day. The service is available 24 hours a day, anywhere in Victoria.

Priority Primary Care Centres (PPCCs)

PPCCs provide urgent, non-life-threatening care to help ease pressure on hospital emergency departments. GP-led and nurseled, they offer prompt treatment for conditions that don't require ED-level care. Funded by the Victorian Government, PPCCs are part of the Medicare Urgent Care Clinic network. Scan the QR code to find your closest PPCC.



Victorian Virtual Emergency Department (VVED)

The Victorian Virtual Emergency Department (VVED) is a public health service that provides 24/7 emergency care for non-life-threatening conditions. It allows people anywhere in Victoria to connect with emergency nurses and doctors via telehealth, with interpreter services available. The VVED ensures patients receive timely, efficient care without needing to visit a hospital. Scan the QR Code to be taken directly to the VVED.
