
TERM 2 NEWSLETTER

In this edition of the newsletter, I want to highlight one of our core priorities as a school: our commitment to learning and growth for all students.

All students have recently participated in the school's exam program, and we were very pleased with the commitment and effort they demonstrated throughout this period.

The purpose of these exams is to provide students with a positive and constructive experience, offering valuable feedback to support their learning and academic growth. For our Year 10 and 11 students, this involved sitting six exams over eight days—a significant undertaking and, for many, a new and challenging experience.


We were particularly impressed by the level of preparation, study, and revision shown by students across the campus. Their approach to the exams reflects a growing understanding of the importance of building strong learning habits, and we are confident this experience will support their development moving forward.

In relation to exams, assessment, and the ability to recall key learning, the image below illustrates a core principle of how learning occurs and is retained. It shows that information from the environment enters our working memory through attention to learning, but without purposeful strategies such as revision and study, much of this information is forgotten rather than retained. For learning to become embedded in long-term memory, it must be revisited, reviewed, and actively worked with over time. This process strengthens memory pathways and increases the likelihood that students will remember and apply their knowledge in future contexts.

As a school, our role is to create the conditions and structures that support this process. This includes:

- Designing lessons that encourage deep thinking and recall
- Checking for understanding regularly and responding effectively
- Promoting regular revision and retrieval practice
- Helping students understand how memory works so they can take greater responsibility for their own learning

By doing this, we ensure that learning is not just experienced once and then forgotten, but instead becomes durable, meaningful, and transferable, firmly established in long-term memory where it can support future learning and success.



We pride ourselves on knowing our students well, first and foremost as individuals within our school community, and equally as learners. Building positive relationships allows us to create a safe and supportive environment where every student feels known, valued, and understood. As educators, we are committed to catering to the individual needs of our students, recognising that each learner progresses at their own pace and brings unique strengths, interests, and learning experiences to the classroom.

Our focus is on achieving learning growth for all students, not just academic achievement at a single point in time. Whether a student is performing above, at, or below the expected level, we are committed to ensuring they experience measurable progress in their learning.

This includes:

- Explicitly teaching and checking in for understanding
- Regularly monitoring progress and adjusting teaching strategies
- Providing targeted support and extension as needed
- Using data and evidence to inform our teaching and interventions
- Promoting a growth mindset, where students see learning as an ongoing journey

By having a culture of high expectations, support, and continuous improvement, we aim to empower every student to reach their potential and develop the confidence, knowledge, and skills they need for future success.

Please take the opportunity to read about the many wonderful opportunities our students are engaged in across EKC throughout this edition of the newsletter. It's a great reflection of the diverse, vibrant, and supportive learning environment we strive to create every day.

STUDENT SAFETY BEFORE AND AFTER SCHOOL SUPERVISION

Student safety at Essendon Keilor College is our highest priority and the safe and appropriate supervision of students is an important element of our duty of care to students. Part of this duty is ensuring parents and students are aware of our student supervision arrangements before and after school.

Before school: School grounds are supervised by staff moving through the grounds from 8:30am. Direct teacher supervision allocated to key bus stop areas occurs from 8:40am.

After school: The main campus bus stop areas are supervised until 3:15pm

Students on school grounds outside these times will not be supervised (unless they are attending a campus breakfast club on the designated day).

Parents/carers are requested to ensure that students do not attend school outside of these supervised times unless they are attending a before or after school extra curricular activity such as sports training.

As we wrap up another busy and rewarding term across the Middle Years campuses, I want to take this opportunity to reflect on the remarkable breadth of learning, exploration, and achievement that has taken place over the past eleven weeks.

As we know, engagement is key to long-term learning success for our Middle Years students, and this term has offered them an abundance of opportunities to be engaged. Events within the Middle Years have included a year-level camp for our Year 8 students, music performance evenings, multiple wellbeing incursions focusing on respectful relationships both in person and online, and subject excursions in a range of curriculum areas including Science, Humanities, Outdoor Education, STEM, and Languages, as well as a huge array of sporting competitions.

My key theme when addressing students this year is 'Do Your Best to Achieve Success'. We know that each of our students is at a different point in terms of their level of academic achievement, but by saying yes to positive opportunities, being present at school every day, and putting effort into each lesson, students are giving themselves the best possible chance to maximise their learning growth. It was pleasing to see that our GPA average across the Middle Years is 3.7 out of 4 — indicating that, across the board, Middle Years students are coming to class prepared and are engaging in learning to a high standard, which is fantastic.

During this term, students were surveyed on their experience at school through the annual DET Attitudes to School Survey (AtoSS). It was evident through the analysis of these results that our current school foci on student learning, engagement, and wellbeing are having a positive impact on our students, with strong results in Sense of Connectedness, Stimulated Learning, High Expectations for Success, Sense of Confidence, Effective Teaching Time, and Teacher Concern. These results also reflected the positive transition that our Year 7 students have had into secondary school, building upon the already high results our students reported back in 2024.

At the start of next term, Year 7 and 9 parents will receive students' individual NAPLAN results. Indicative cohort results have already been released to schools, and this early data shows the positive impact we're having in achieving learning growth for all students, no matter their starting point. I look forward to being able to share more of these results with the school community in the near future.

A big thank you to all our staff — both teaching and education support — for your efforts this term in providing such a wide array of learning and engagement opportunities for our students.

I hope all students have a relaxing mid-year break, using this as an opportunity to disconnect from devices and catch up with their friends and family in person. Thank you to all parents and carers for your ongoing support, and I look forward to seeing you all at the start of Term 3.

As we reach the end of Term 2, I'd like to take this opportunity to reflect on a busy, rewarding, and action-packed term across our senior campus.

Student Voice & Agency and Effective Teaching Time also saw substantial increases in positive student results. This data helps shape new programs and initiatives to continue to support student wellbeing and engagement and we look forward to continuing to work with our students to create the most positive school experience possible.

As we look ahead to Semester 2, I encourage all students to take a moment over the break to reflect on their achievements, set new goals, and return with renewed energy and determination. Whether you're entering your final semester of Year 12 or continuing your senior journey, we're here to support you every step of the way.

Thank you to our staff, families, and broader school community for your continued support. Wishing everyone a restful and safe break—and the very best of luck for Semester 2.


PRODUCTION - MATLIDA JNR

RESPECTFUL RELATIONSHIPS

Respectful relationships education is fundamentation at Essendon Keilor College. It supports students to develop the knowledge, attitudes and skills needed for respectful relationships and helps to build respect, equality and inclusivity across the entire school community. Research tells us that providing Respectful Relationships education at school can lead to positive impacts on students' academic outcomes, their mental health, classroom behaviour and relationships.

EKC uses the Department of Education's evidence-based teaching and learning resources to teach our students about Respectful Relationships from Year 7-12, as well as provide a range of incursions to complement classroom activities. This term the middle years has largely focused on Emotional Literacy and Personal and Cultural Strengths:

- **Emotional Literacy** helps students to learn how to be aware of, understand and use information about their own emotions and the emotions of others.
- **Personal and Cultural Strengths** helps students to learn how to recognise and understand their own and others' strengths and positive qualities, and how to identify how the values and strengths they learn from their family and culture help them to treat others with respect.

Cooper's goal is to connect people with simple tools to improve wellbeing and thrive in life. Cooper spoke passionately about the importance of young people to think differently about mental health and wellbeing and how everyone can utilise mindfulness, gratitude, kindness and empathy within their everyday lives.





YEAR 10 PAT CRONIN FOUNDATION

Students participated in an interactive revolved presentation that around hearing real and relatable stories about social violence that explored a number of themes. Much of the session surrounded the story of Pat Cronin, a young man tragically killed by a coward punch attack

in 2016 while trying to help a mate who was being attacked. Facilitator Aidan offered several tips and strategies young people can employ to deal with anger and aggression, choices and consequences, defusing conflict. Using Pat's story illustrates the worst possible outcome of social violence, and helps students make wise choices. Students were able to better understand how to deal with anger before it becomes aggression and discuss and develop an awareness of strategies that suit them and their friends.



YEAR 12 PARTY SAFE INCURSION

Red Frogs visited our Year 12 students to deliver their Party Safe workshop to help equip them to navigate many of the situations they may be confronted with in various party environments, A U S T R A L I A such as after parties and music festivals.



This hands-on program helped students identify the dangers present in party situations and will assist in equipping them with strategies to make informed decisions to protect themselves and others. Real-life stories from facilitators who are experienced as first responders at party events like Schoolies helped to dispel mainstream perceptions on excessive alcohol consumption and recreational drug use, and empower students to be socially responsible and safe.



YEAR 11 ELEVATE EDUCATION STUDY SKILLS SEMINAR

Year 11 VCE students undertook a session with Elevate Education to help them prepare for their mid-year exams. The high-energy session helped students to best utilise their time when studying with a particular focus on these areas:

Techniques for overcoming procrastination







RIDE SMART – E-BIKE INFORMATION

In recent months, Moonee Valley City Council and local Police have received an increasing number of complaints from members of the community regarding the improper use of Electric Power-Assisted bicycles (e-bikes).

E-bikes are fast, efficient, and ecofriendly. But their rising popularity comes with risks many riders' underestimate. These include:

- Heavier than traditional bikes;
- Often used on roads without proper training; and
- Subject to modifications that increase their speed over the legal limit.

Considering the above risks, there have been certain laws imposed relating to e-bikes. These include the following:

- An e-bike may only have a maximum continuous rated power of 250W, of which the output is:
 - o progressively reduced as the cycle's travel speed increases above 6 km/h; and
 - o cut off, where:
 - the cycle reaches a speed of 25 km/h; or
 - the cyclist is not pedalling, and the travel speed exceeds 6km/h.

Any e-bike which has been modified to meet any of the below criteria would be deemed a motor vehicle and be subject to the same requirements as that of a motorcycle:

- To allow more than 250 watts to be produced or to exceed 25km/h assisted speed;
- Be propelled by the motor up to a maximum of 6km/h without the rider pedalling;
 and
- Have a petrol-powered motor attached.

Presently, Police have observed an increase in e-bikes being used on the road, footpaths and bike tracks in the Moonee Valley area which appear to fall outside the laws imposed on e-bikes.

E-bikes which have been illegally modified or are involved in dangerous driving, not only increase the risk of serious injury to the rider but may result in the following pecuniary enforcement governed under the Road Safety Act, Road Rules Victoria & Crimes Act.

Persons riding illegal or modified e-bikes may be charged with:

- Unlicensed driving;
- Use unregistered motor vehicle or motorcycle;
- Fail to comply with standards for registration;
- Culpable / dangerous / careless driving

This may result in expensive fines, requirements to attend court, criminal conviction and vehicle impoundment whereby the owner of the vehicle is again subject to the associated costs.

To avoid injury and fines please ensure that any riding is done in a safe and legal manner on an e-bike that complies with Victorian Law.



YEAR 9 OUTDOOR EDUCATION TERM 2 HIGHLIGHTS

YEAR 10 OUTDOOR EDUCATION

This year marked the exciting introduction of **Outdoor Education** as a new semester-long subject for our Year 10 students. Designed to offer a unique and enriching learning experience beyond the traditional classroom, the subject encourages students to explore and understand the natural world around them, while building valuable life skills.

Throughout the semester, students have engaged in a variety of hands-on activities that brought the curriculum to life. Early in the term, local walks around the school and surrounding areas allowed students to assess and reflect on the health and quality of different environments. These excursions set the foundation for deeper learning and prompted important discussions about our role in preserving the spaces we live and play in.

The course is divided into two key units. In **Unit 1: Motivations and Relationships,** students examined the different ways people connect with the outdoors and what motivates individuals and groups to spend time in nature. **Unit 2: Environmental Sustainability and Management** then challenged students to consider the impact of human activity on the environment and explore sustainable practices for the future.

To cap off the unit, students participated in a multi-day **sailing camp**, where they put theory into practice—navigating, working in teams, and applying their environmental knowledge in a real-world setting.

We look forward to seeing how this new subject continues to grow and inspire future students to connect with the natural world.

YEAR 9 LANGUAGE CULTURAL DAY NGV EXCURSION – JAPANESE

Hisashiburi desu! (long time no see)

On May 23rd year 9 Japanese language students traveled to the city where they would attend the Konnichiwa Japan Japanese artwork exhibition at the National Gallery of Victoria.



Our group was greeted by Sara; an NGV educator who introduced the group to traditional Japanese artwork, starting with beautiful multi-panel hand-painted Japanese folding screens known traditionally as *Byőbu* in Japan. Did you know the gallery's earliest screen dates back to 1565? Talk about resilience.

While captivatingly beautiful, Japanese folding screens were initially utilised to block drafts in Japanese homes and over time they evolved to convey the status and wealth of their owners.

The paintings engage viewers with its beauty and composition and we as a group were prompted to reflect on the intricate details reflected in the screen on display to develop our ability to identify key features of traditional Japanese art:

"What angle are we seeing in this landscape?"
"What season do you think it is and how can you tell according to the nature
embedded?"

"Do you know why there is so much negative space?"

The group also had the opportunity to draw their own multi-panel artwork and other group members guessed what season was depicted and discussed how they drew those conclusions.

Next were Japanese ceramics. Japanese pottery, like much of its artwork, is minimalistic. Usually symmetry is a sign of aesthetics and we learnt about "Kintsugi" the art of repairing broken pottery by mending cracks and breaks with lacquer and gold.

Repairs reflect the object's history rather than disguising it. Leading one to reflect on an object's journey and resilience. It is said this artform was inspired by a Shogun who, after breaking his favourite tea bowl, had it repaired with metal staples, which he found unappealing.



After the tour, we dined at Shujinko on Flinders St. Students enjoyed a range of dishes like

"Ramen" - Rich broth Japanese soup with egg noodles
"Tonkatsu" - Deep-fried pork cutlet
"Edamame" - Japanese soybeans

There were vegetarian options and so there was something for everyone.

Coincidentally the owner was an old friend who treated the students to "Karaage" - Japanese-style fried chicken in the house. Yes chef!

Those studying Japanese at the senior campus will come to experience many forms of Japanese culture and cuisine as I intend to take students on an excursion each term.




YEAR 9 LANGUAGE CULTURAL DAY NGV EXCURSION - ITALIAN

MIDDLE YEARS SCIENCE


What an exciting and educational term it has been in Science!


Our Year 7 students explored habitats and biodiversity within ecosystems, while also learning how scientists classify living organisms. To consolidate their classroom learning, they visited both a local park and Melbourne Zoo to investigate a variety of animal habitats firsthand.


Year 8 students delved deeper into the fascinating world of matter, focusing on atomic structure and the periodic table. This unit was brought to life through a series of engaging practical experiments, including making elephant's toothpaste, slime, and bouncy balls—with varying degrees of success!

Meanwhile, our Year 9 students explored the world of electricity, learning about circuits and photovoltaic cells. The unit sparked lots of enthusiasm and may have even inspired some future physicists!

In addition, our Year 8 and selected Year 9 HAP (High Achievers Program) students are participating in the international research initiative Growth Beyond Earth. As part of this NASA-affiliated program, students constructed plant growth chambers modeled after those used on the International Space Station. They were given a variety of plant samples to cultivate, with data logged on our dedicated Fairchild/NASA portal. We're excited to continue this journey with an Immersion Day at La Trobe University early in Term 3, as we move into the second phase of our growth protocol.













HEALTH AND HUMAN DEVELOPMENT ROAD TO SAFETY EXCURSION

On the 30th of April, all year 12 Health and Human development students went on an excursion to the Melbourne Museum, to prepare us for our upcoming SAC regarding health promotion.

We attended a morning session, where we all were seated and taken through a powerpoint presentation from informative and knowledgeable speakers revolving around road laws, road safety and faced with frightening statistics around mortality rates and injury within Australia, which we were then quizzed on and some even won prizes!

After our morning session was finished, we were then split into our school groups and invited for morning tea, which consisted of muffins, fruits and other snacks. After we had something to eat, we continued with our first official session, where we applied our prior knowledge around the Ottawa Charter and worked in groups to complete small challenges, whilst learning about potential road risks, dangers, and ways to avoid collisions, whilst also learning about how to break up, and properly answer exam questions we may find on our end of year exams.

Finishing our first session, we continued to the next, where we were free to roam around and view different simulations, videos and examples of road safety, and how we could protect ourselves on the road. The highlight being a VR experience, in which we were able to experience first hand how cars, protective measures and road safety laws have changed over the ages, from the early 1900s to the present day! We found this so exciting as it allowed us to be able to both compare and contrast different eras and how we viewed road safety over different eras.






KEILOR WINTER SOIREE
